Having removed our shoes we settled ourselves comfortably on the floor as we chatted happily with our new friends and met some of their families. Calling it a feast was not an exaggeration! Bowls of wonderful homemade food came from all directions and we gladly tucked in. There was much to sample and plenty to share as bowls and plates were passed in all directions. It was interesting to see the manner in which prayer, while being a hugely important part of the evening, just seemed to happen naturally. Conversation continued to flow, while a number of the ladies simply gathered at one side of the room and gracefully said their prayers as they stood and bowed as they faced towards Mecca.

While for us this was a very enjoyable occasion, one couldn't help feeling that for these ladies who have come to make their homes and raise their families here in Tralee, even small gestures of friendship must hold such significance.

We look forward to many more meetings with our new friends in the future as we continue to learn from each other in a spirit of good humour and mutual respect.
